On 9th March 2017, a research party of 13 members met in Fort Augustus, Scotland. The Loch Ness Investigation Bureau (officially formed in 1961 and closed in 1972) was rebooted in early 2017 after a myriad of monster sightings in lakes, rivers and seas from Denmark and Sweden to Germany, and even in Minnesota, USA.

The newly formed Loch Ness Investigation Bureau Rebooted (LNIBR) research team had five days in which to conduct an investigation of Loch Ness, keeping watch day and night. A fortunate encounter with the naturalist and Loch Ness researcher Adrian Shine of The Loch Ness Project in Drumnadrochit on 11th March brought insights into the team's quest through the generous sharing of his expertise.

The investigative report here is supplemented by the many sightings recorded and printed in this publication. These sightings have been sent in by individual witnesses and will over time be validated through stringent testing by the LNIBR.

Alongside the photographic evidence presented, we publish for the first time a bibliography of new editions on the subject of the Loch Ness Monster sent in by authors, researchers and the general public.



An intense 28-hour watch cycle by LNIBR member Helen Allsebrook yields inconclusive results from submersible window due to freak midnight sun exposure.






An unusual publication sent in by Chloe and Sally Alexander, UK.

A note on the cover: Gesso background gilded with moongold. The gilding was marbled and Urquhart Castle and the illusion of Nessie (in a Celtic style, as a link back to St Columba in AD 563 who may have been the first person to see a 'beast' in Loch Ness) were added with hand cut stamps. The title 57° refers to part of the Northern coordinates for Loch Ness.



A vintage publication sent in by Daniel Lehan, UK: *Nessie In La La Land*, Daniel of Thanet. Pip Squeak Press, California (01/04/1972). Sharp-eyed readers will notice a figure astonishingly similar to the Wildman featured on the cover of *Professor Fowler's Weirdology* published two decades earlier, which raises more questions. Did these creatures regroup for further battles on the Pacific coast? And if so, how did the Loch Ness monster navigate those 7588 nautical miles via the Panama Canal to reach Los Angeles?


Appressorium Books



It includes tips on How to Cook Monster (at Gas Mark 6 for three days, feeds c.5000). Recipes include Monster en Croute, Monster Liver Pate and Smoked Fillet of Monster.

Just one month earlier, Mike Clements, UK, witnessed this appearance at Loch Ness on 21st December 2016 at 2.22pm.
















The Disappearance of the Loch Ness Monster - a report of new sightings outside the coast of Sweden.

Eva Hejdström in Sweden found this publication from 2008 discussing the disappearance of the Loch Ness Monster from Scotland at a time when sightings began to occur around the coastal islands and inland lakes of Sweden.



Mette-Sofie D. Ambeck picked up this book in a charity shop in Hurup Thy, Denmark for a bargain 4DKK (about 45p), a great find and another viewpoint on the Loch Ness Monster's origins.





A popular seaside town of faded Victorian splendour, Hastings recent influx of urban newcomers has been matched by a throng of bucolic Nessies. Having successfully negotiated the move south from the deep and bitter waters of Loch Ness, the Nessies are regularly spotted cavorting in the channel. Rough seas appear to delight them and facilitate surfing of the larger waves close to shore.

Scientists have suggested the seafood rich waters, in particular plentiful supplies of Dover Sole, may be contributing to their startlingly population increase. The breeding habits of the Nessie though much speculated upon, remain a mystery.

The current shortage of hotel rooms due to media interest should ease once David Attenborough's *Nessie and Me* screens (BBC1, 9th March 2017 at 8pm).


